From Newspaper Page to Oldcastle Stage: Writing *Water, Water, Everywhere* . . .

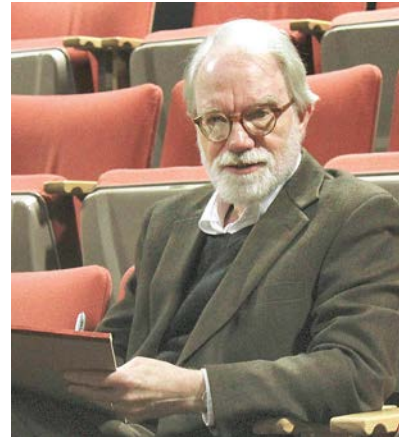
Our speaker for the Fall Potluck is Eric Peterson, Producing Artistic Director of Oldcastle Theatre. To spark our interest in the play, Eric will tell us about how and why he decided to write *Water, Water, Everywhere...*, a play set in the fictional town of Waloomsac, Vermont, where a local factory has been releasing perfluorooctanoic acid (PFOA) into the air, soil, and water.

First, Eric cautions that the play is fiction, not a documentary. However, there are many similarities between events in the play and actual events experienced by residents of Bennington and surrounding areas. As in the play, high levels of PFOA were found in the water, and local officials, business leaders, and the factory owner downplayed the health threat. And as in the play, there was a local tension between jobs and the environment.

The news cycle helped Peterson craft his play: Each morning, he read the news about the PFOA crisis in the *Bennington Banner* and *VT Digger*; each evening, he sat down to write. Asked how disparate chunks of news stories could lead to a coherent play, Eric explained: "Once I came up with the idea of a newsroom for the set, everything started to come together."

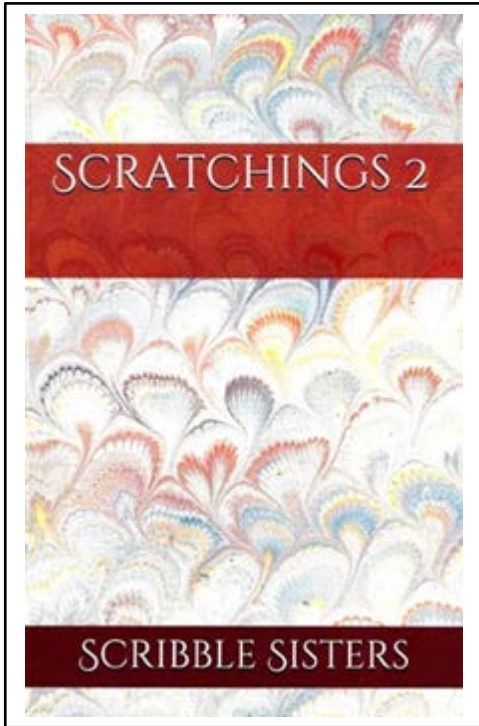
Although *Water, Water, Everywhere...* was written in response to a local situation,

what is especially frightening, according to Peterson, is that polluters "continue to operate all over the country because they provide jobs."



Almost 50 years ago, Peterson and some actor friends started an equity theater in Bennington. During that time, he has directed and produced hundreds of plays, including his own work: *Civil Union*; *Revolutionary Wizard: Ben Franklin*; *The Life and Times of Dorothy Parker*; and an adaptation of Dickens' *A Tale of Two Cities*.

In addition to his work with Oldcastle, Peterson has taught at the high school and college level and has, with Tim Foley, taught a Theatre Arts Class at the Southwestern Vermont Career Development Center for 26 years. Peterson has served as president of the Vermont Arts Council and of the Bennington Downtown Alliance.

Bennington AAUW Awards Three Scholarships

With the award of three scholarships for the fall semester, AAUW's Scholarship Program has reached a total of \$45,464! This figure includes \$39,339 in scholarships and \$6,125 for textbooks since the program began in 2007. All funds for scholarships are raised by AAUW members through direct donations by the Silent Angels, fundraisers at Oldcastle Theatre, memorial gifts, and profits from the books published by the Scribble Sisters.

Funds for textbooks are collected by AAUW book group members in memory of the founder, Marge Carter. Her husband has generously matched the book group collection each year.

Thirty-nine different students have benefitted from 92 one-semester awards. This semester's awards have gone to three non-traditional women who have taken the big step to continue their education at Community College of Vermont.

In determining the scholarship awards, the committee considers the cost of childcare, transportation, and internet access for some of the students in addition to the cost of tuition and books.

Wendy Lyons

Wendy Lyons of Bennington, was awarded a fourth scholarship to help her to reach her goal of earning a Liberal Arts Degree. She will receive a \$700 scholarship, plus \$300 toward textbooks. Ms. Lyons, 52, had not planned on taking classes over the summer, but after losing her job unexpectedly, she changed her mind and became a full time student. Throughout Wendy's time at CCV, she has been a committed volunteer and leader through the Community of Student Representatives (CSR).

This summer Wendy is taking "Professional Field Experience," interning at the Kitchen Cupboard in Bennington. She will be attending a conference in Washington DC for the National Alliance to End Homelessness as the State Captain for Vermont. At that conference she will also be representing an organization out of Boston called "Together She Can." They give out toiletries to homeless people. This summer Wendy plans to open a "Together She Can" chapter at the Kitchen Cupboard. "If that is not enough," she says, "I will be attending the annual 'Capitol Hill Day' and be meeting with the Representative and Senators from Vermont."

All of these activities will further her dream of helping families grow in positive ways. In the fall she will use her AAUW scholarship to take three courses including American Judicial Process, Introduction to Ethics, and Interpersonal and Small Group Communication.

Ms. Lyons received high praise from Maggie Montovan, who served with her on the Board of Trustees of the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship in Bennington. "She was always thoughtful in discussion, and timely in administrative matters. Her academic aspirations are admirable and her work ethic shines through."

Wendy has joined the Bennington Branch and we hope to see her at branch programs and events this year.

Cassandra Furciniti

Cassandra Furciniti, 29, of Bennington will receive her second scholarship, this time for \$700. She is studying Early Childhood Education at the Community College of Vermont. Her goal is to open her own home daycare center,

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something that has been a dream since she was a young child. She has a daughter, 2 ½, and a son, 10 months old.

In an essay submitted for the award, Ms. Furciniti wrote about the first class she took at college. "I learned a lot about the career path I have chosen and many different ideas on how I can run my own child care center. I learned different techniques that I could use in my classrooms and that I will have to work with parents and how to communicate with them."

Karen P. Burnell, M.Ed., taught a class Ms. Furciniti took, titled "Supporting Young Children with Diverse Abilities." She wrote in a letter of recommendation, "Cassie's characteristics of commitment, diligence, dependability and interest in learning will serve her well as she progresses forward in meeting these goals."

In addition to attending college and caring for her two children, Cassandra works full time as Assistant Staffing Coordinator at J. J. Young. Ms. Furciniti and her fiancé plan to marry on August 22, 2020 and were recently approved for a house through Habitat for Humanity.

In a letter Ms. Furciniti wrote, "I want to thank all of the Bennington Branch members for awarding me the AAUW scholarship. I would also like to thank Jennifer Kern for all the help she has given me in getting this scholarship."

Desiree Walizer

Desiree Walizer, 27, of Cambridge, N.Y., will receive her fourth scholarship, this time for \$600. She is working toward an Associate Degree in Human Services with Certification in Substance Abuse.

Ms. Walizer is a residential counselor at Vermont School for Girls in Bennington (VPI-South). "Every day I go to work and talk to the kids about how important school is and help them with their school work. How can I continue to go to work and tell these kids to do something I myself just keep running from?" Ms. Walizer wrote in her scholarship essay. "Then I remember how much I have accomplished already and all the reasons to keep pushing forward."

Ms. Walizer has been highly recommended by Lori Vadakin, MA, LADC, Director of Trauma Integrative Services for VPI-South. She wrote, "I continue to observe Desiree's compassion and professionalism as a dorm staff for VPI-South. I have witnessed her skills of cultivating safety, attunement, making students feel comfortable, modeling mutual respect and a gift of maintaining a positive attitude. I can attest that Desiree is highly motivated and it is a great pleasure to watch her grow as an individual."

Leslie Rousseau, Assistant Professor, Academic Advisor, Transfer and Career Counselor at Columbia-Greene Community College in Hudson, N.Y., describes herself as one of Desiree's biggest fans. She tutored Desiree through the TRIO Upward Bound program when she was a senior in high school. "I learned that Desiree went through some very difficult times after she graduated from high school," she wrote. "There is one thing I know for sure – she has come out a newer, stronger Desiree in the end."

In a note of appreciation, Ms. Walizer wrote, "I want to start out by saying how thankful I am for this honor once again. I want to thank you for your continued support and for believing in me."

The Scholarship Committee is chaired by Jennifer Kern, and includes Gudrun Hutchins and Judy Murphy. Beth Tegart joined the committee for this meeting due to the absence of Andrea Weisberg.
